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A Message from Qur Chair

As another year draws to a close, I would like to highlight key moments from the past year while also reflecting on our Society's progress over the six years since our incorporation. In our early meetings, gathered around a dining room table, it was evident that the room was filled with passion and positive energy. That same spirit has propelled us forward, supported and encouraged by the wider community.

The residents of Lunenburg and Queens counties face disparities in access to end-of-life supports and designated beds compared to other regions of Nova Scotia. Addressing this inequity is a driving force for us. Although the care from medical professionals is outstanding, we continually hear stories of experiences in hospitals lacking privacy, comfort, and dignity at end of life. We are dedicated to changing this.

The demand for palliative care in Lunenburg and Queens counties is steadily rising, increasing from 258 residents in 2016 to 344 in 2024. As a Society, we collaborate with healthcare providers who deliver compassionate and professional end-of-life care, offering resources, funding for professional development, and support for patients.

This year, has been one of connection and care. A few highlights include the launch of our Volunteer Visitation Program; the continuation of Coffee Clubs in Bridgewater and Mahone Bay; Cooking for Care; Beacon of Hope and Solace Funds to support families and loved ones; our second End of Life Expo; and reviewing and revising our Strategic Plan.

Our mission is powered by community spirit. Our two primary fundraisers, the Hope fore Hospice Golf Tournament and Starry Night Gala, were immensely successful, raising over \$100,000 for the Society. A number of fundraisers were held on our behalf as well. We are deeply grateful for the ongoing support from our community.

We continue to meet with Nova Scotia Health regional staff, our four MLAs and local leaders. Moreover, we've had discussions with the Premier to advance our case for hospice care.

As we commemorate the achievements of the past year, we acknowledge that none of this would be feasible without the support of our community donors and sponsors, our dedicated volunteers, passionate staff, and a volunteer Board that contributes both expertise and geographic representation. This year, we bid farewell to two Board members, Liz Finney and Alan Scott. As a founding member, Liz has shared her knowledge and expertise to advance our mission. Alan, as treasurer, has provided us with financial guidance and comprehensive reporting. We extend our heartfelt thanks to them.

To all our supporters, thank you for believing in our mission and for your unwavering support of our work. We will continue to strive toward our goals.

A New Way to Care – Together

This year marked the launch of our Volunteer Visitation Program, led with dedication by coordinator Tara Jaskowiak. At its heart, this program is about people — neighbours reaching out to neighbours, offering time, kindness, and a listening ear.

Our volunteers completed specialized training to become friendly visitors for palliative patients, whether in their homes or in hospital. Each volunteer is thoughtfully matched with someone who shares similar interests, creating space for genuine companionship and meaningful conversation.

The impact has been immediate and heartfelt. Families, patients, and volunteers alike have shared how these visits bring comfort, connection, and moments of joy during challenging times.

A Gift of Comfort for Queens

Thanks to the generosity of our donors, we supported the Queens General Auxiliary in purchasing a cuddle bed. These specialized larger hospital beds allow patients and loved ones to be close — sharing comfort, touch, and connection — while still meeting all medical needs. In palliative care, that closeness can mean the world

People are our Programs

Throughout the year, we've continued to walk alongside those experiencing grief. Our Coffee Clubs in Bridgewater and Mahone Bay remain warm, welcoming spaces to share stories and find understanding. Our Cooking for Care initiative brings people together in the kitchen, nourishing both body and spirit.

Through the Beacon of Hope and Solace Fund, more families received help as they navigated the end of life of a loved one.

At our office, we offer ongoing opportunities for connection and growth — from technology support, to creative meditation and Art As Part of Healing, which provide space for reflection and expression.

We also deliver tangible comfort to palliative patients, whether at home or in hospital, through comfort care kits and mouth care kits. Many also receive the warmth of a small quilt or lap blanket — each one lovingly crafted and donated by our talented local quilters and knitters.

Together, we are building a community where care is shared, hope is nurtured, and no one faces life's challenges alone.



Promoting Expanded Palliative Care

We have had meetings with Nova Scotia Health staff to discuss the expansion of program offerings in support of patient care. We have met with the Premier, our four MLA's in Lunenburg and Queens counties, and representatives of all levels of government to empahsize the need for equity in palliative care services across the province, advocate for the opening of the beds at Fishermen's Memorial, and push for recognition of the need for a free-standing hospice. We have shared ideas and resources with other palliative societies and associations provincially.

We are one of the only two areas in Nova Scotia without designated palliative beds and with our elderly and growing population we need more dedicated palliative care supports in Lunenburg and Queens counties. The demand for palliative care in Lunenburg and Queens counties is steadily rising, increasing from 258 residents in 2016 to 344 in 2024.


Celebrating Volunteers
